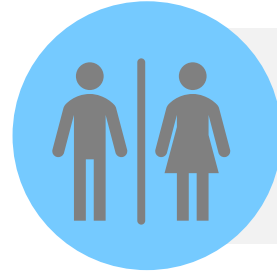

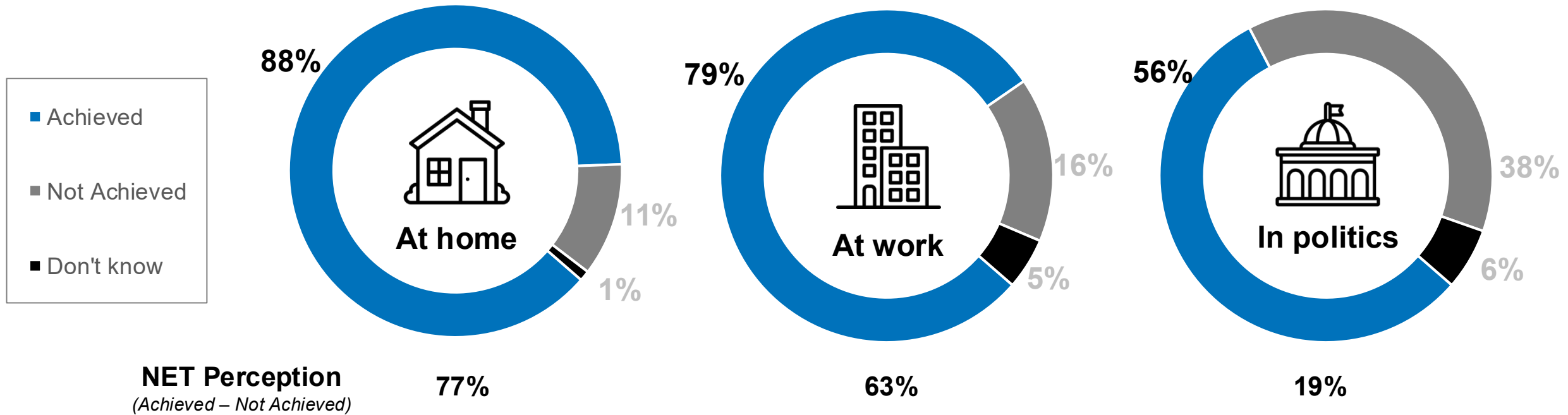

# Filipinos believe there is gender equality in our society

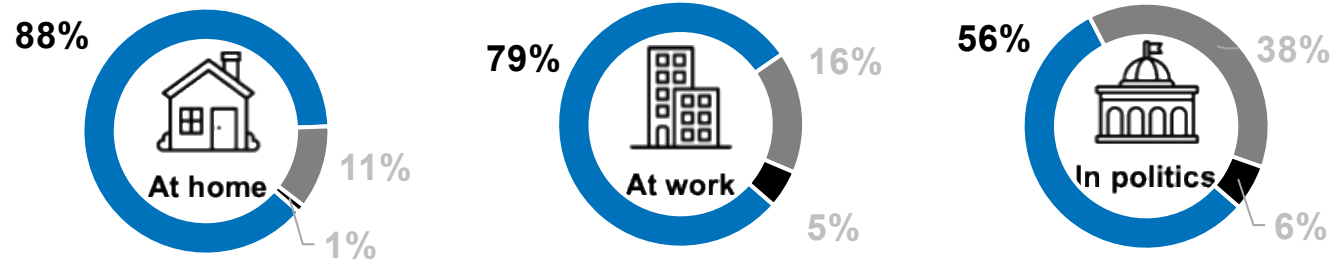
Large majorities say they are treated equally at home and at work

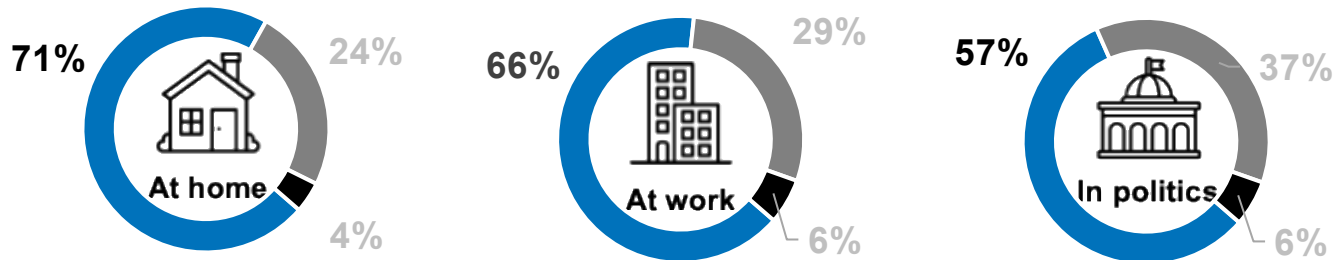

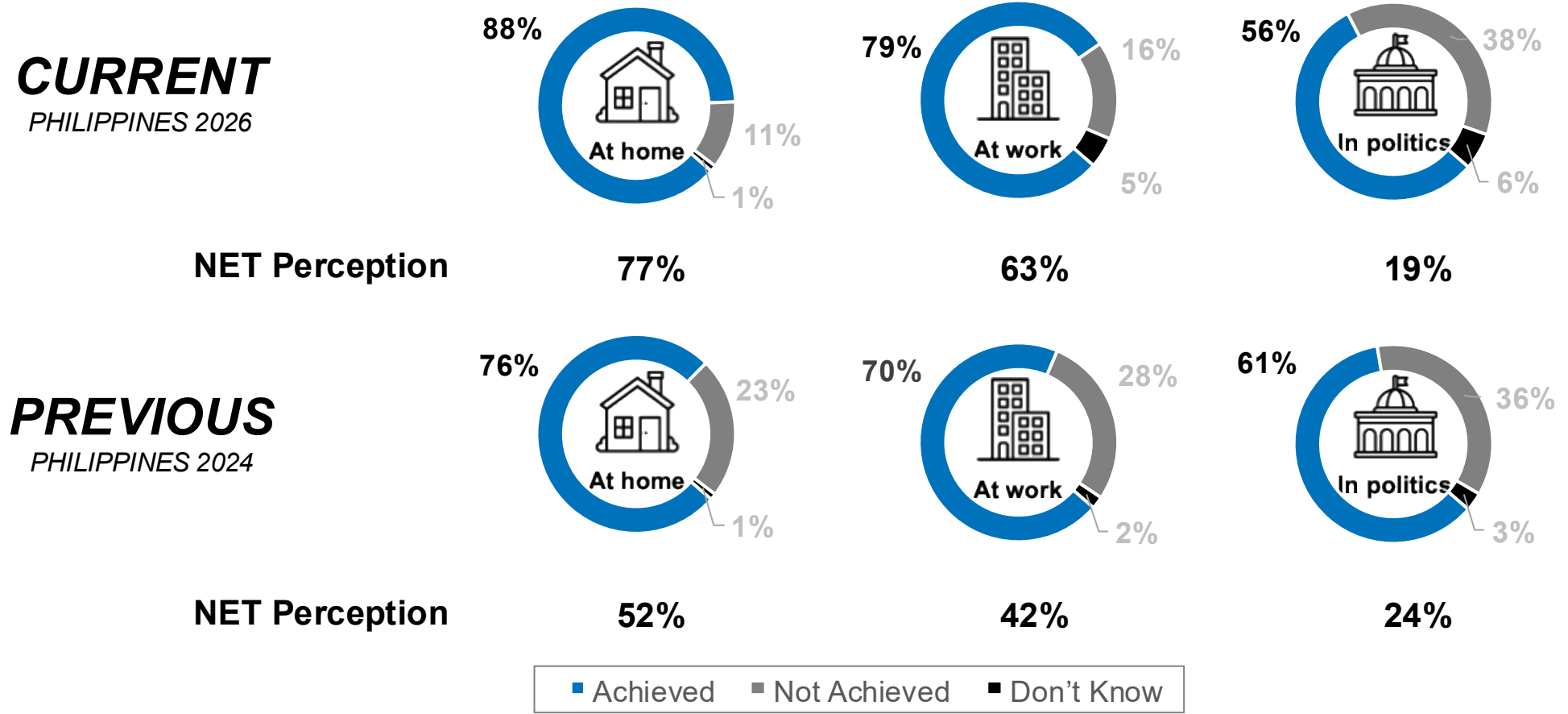

Globally, perceptions on gender equality have improved, particularly in the workplace and in politics.

This growing optimism is attributed to visible institutional policy developments, including anti-discrimination reforms and national initiatives aimed at improving women's access to employment.

# Confidence in gender equality continues to rise among Filipinos

Positive perceptions on equality rose significantly at home and at work, however, progress in politics lags slightly behind

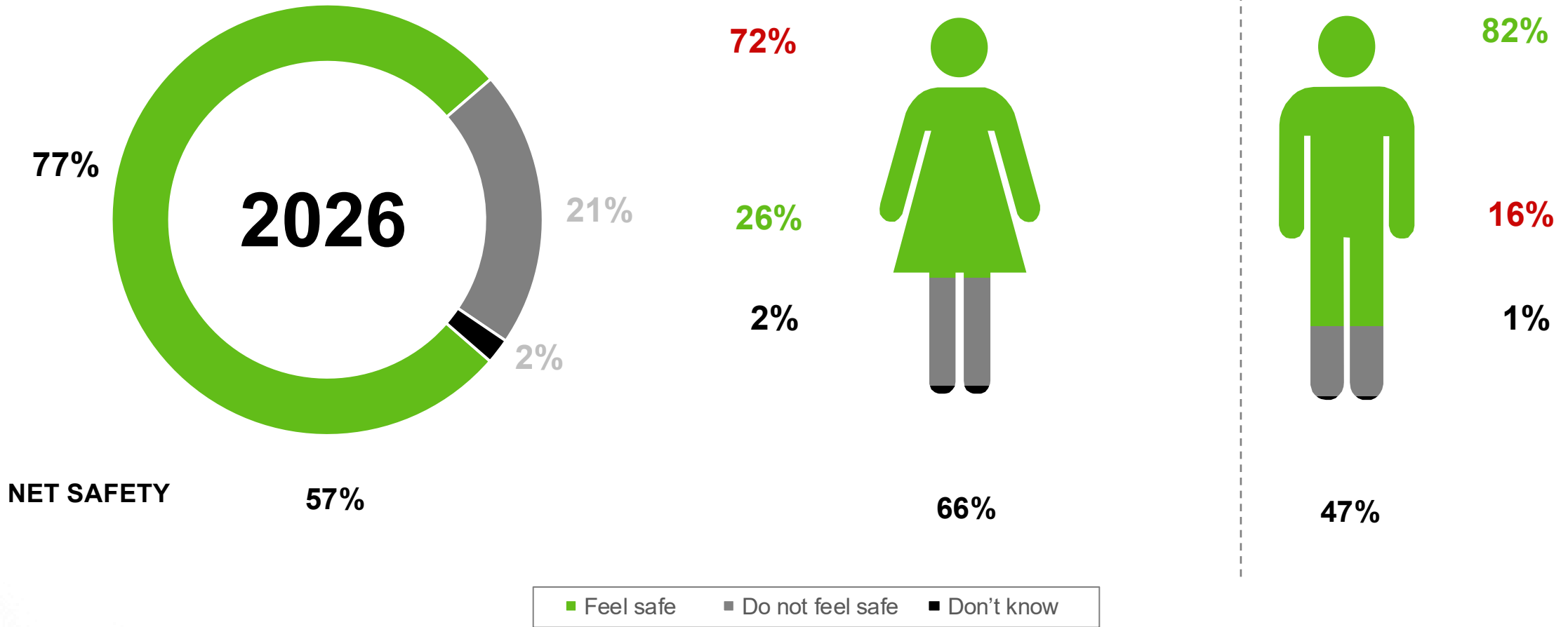

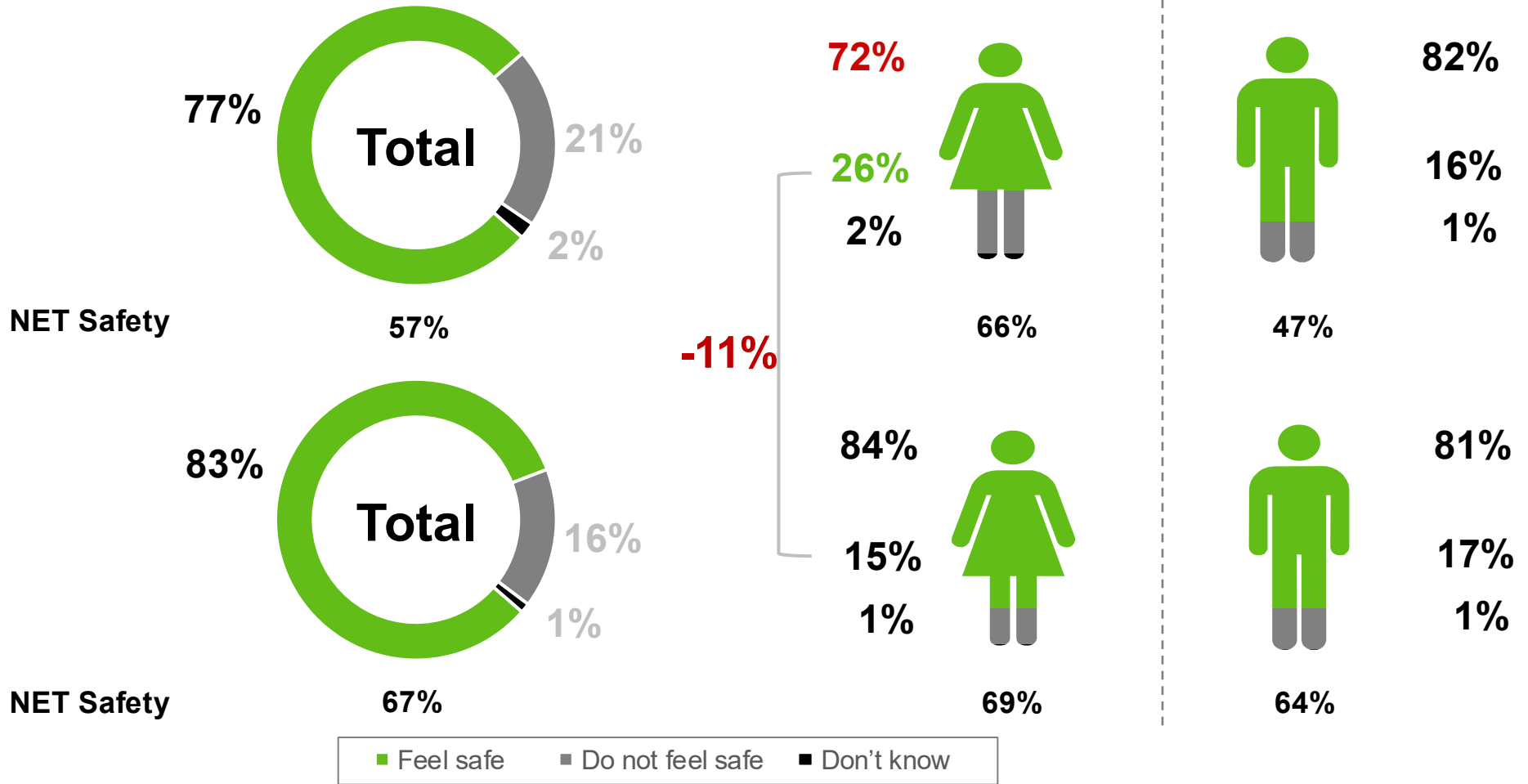

# Women report the sharpest drop in feelings of safety since 2024

Confidence in neighborhood safety declined by 11% among women vs 2 years ago. Ratings remain the same for men.

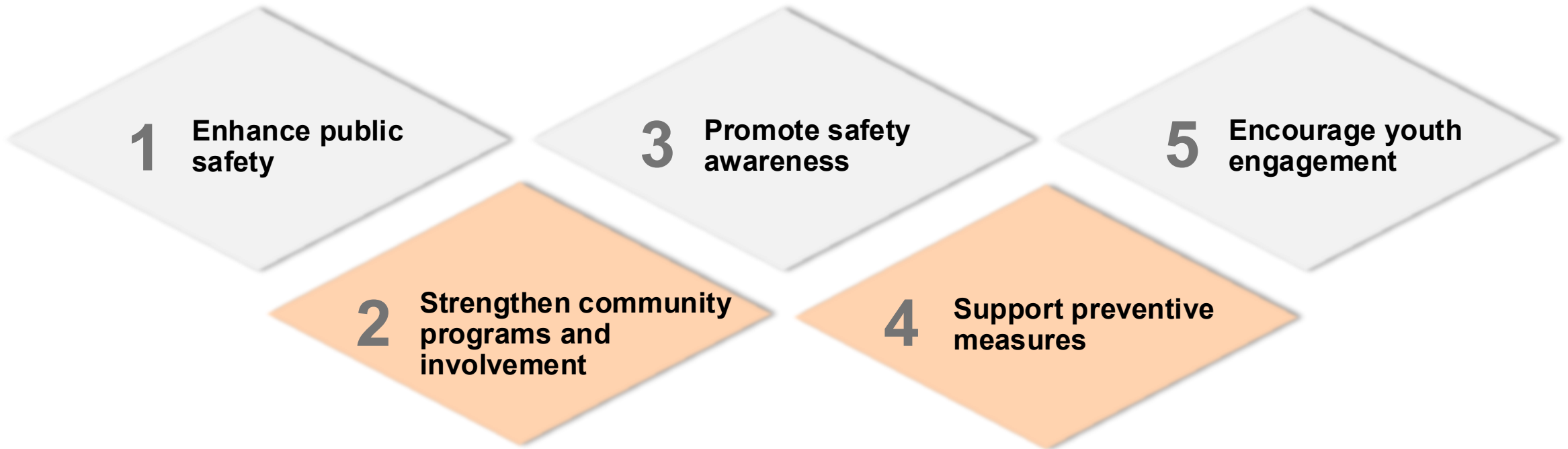


While less than **one in 10 (7%)** Filipino women have experienced violence in the past year ...

# Filipinos see **progress in gender equality** but **better safety** in their communities has deteriorated. The work is far from finished.



**Filipinos continue to see progress in gender equality.** In 2025, most Filipinos believe gender equality has been achieved in key areas of daily life, and these perceptions have improved compared to the previous year.



**Violence existing means worry continuing to loom.** While the Philippines ranks 6th worldwide in women's perception of safety in their neighborhood in 2025, women and younger Filipinos report feeling less safe as compared to the past.

# WVS Survey 2026

## Global methodology:

A total of 44,000 persons were interviewed globally. In each country, a representative sample of around 1,000 men and women were interviewed from November 27, 2025 to February 13, 2026, either face-to-face, via telephone or online.

The margin of error for the survey is between +3-5% at 95% confidence level.
